

# 2023-24 SEASON

The Elks Hoop Shoot is a national free throw contest that has been unleashing gritty kids for more than 50 years. Here's what every Hoop Shoot Director needs to know.

### **HOW DOES IT WORK?**

- Youth ages 8-13 advance through local contests (starting with preliminary contests or a Lodge contest), Districts, States, and Regionals to the National Finals in Chicago.
- Six National Champions will have their names and photos displayed at the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

### WHY HOOP SHOOT?

- Gritty kids=determined hard workers. Gritty kids become gritty adults with strong work ethics and goal-setting skills.
- It's free! The Elks cover travel costs through each level.
- The Hoop Shoot can offer similar life lessons as other sports programs. But what other program offers kids the chance to be in the Hall of Fame?

## LEVELS OF COMPETITION

Youth ages 8-13 are invited to compete in three age groups, 8-9, 10-11, and 12-13, with girls and boys competing separately. Participants can only compete at **ONE** Lodge contest per year. Then, they must win at each level along the way before stamping a ticket to the National Finals.

### **PRELIMINARY**



At the Lodge Director's discretion, in some communities, the season kicks off with a community-hosted contest. Winners advance to the Lodge contest.

### LODGE



The official entry in the contest. Competitors are allowed to participate in ONE Lodge contest a season.

### **DISTRICT\***



Six Lodge winners advance to compete with other participants from nearby Lodge communities.

\*Several states do not hold District contests.

### STATE



District\* winners travel and meet other participants from their home state.

\*Several states do not hold District contests.

### **REGIONAL**



State winners hit the road again as Regional Semi-Finalists—competing against winners from multiple states.

### **FINALS**



The 72 National Finalists compete on the national stage in April in Chicago. Six Finalists are crowned National Champions and are displayed in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame!



# HOST A PRELIMINARY HOOP SHOOT CONTEST





- 1. The 8-9 divisions shoot four feet in front of the regulation foul line.
- 2. The 12-13 boys division shoots with a 29.5" basketball. All other divisions shoot with a 28.5" basketball.
- 3. All contestants should be given an official opportunity to warm up. Ten minutes is recommended.
- 4. Each contestant should be given up to five warm-up shots, if desired, before shooting for score. The number of warm-up shots is at the discretion of the contest coordinator, but it is recommended that five shots are offered. Then, the contestant will shoot their first 10 shots for score, return to the end of the line, and shoot their final 15 shots without additional warm-up.
- 5. After a contestant is handed the ball, they have up to 10 seconds to make a free throw attempt. If a contestant takes longer than 10 seconds to shoot, a penalty occurs and the shot is void. A free throw begins when the ball is given to the contestant at the free throw line. It ends when the try is successful, when it is certain that the try will be unsuccessful, or when the ball becomes dead.
- 6. The contestant must stay behind the foul line until the ball has touched the hoop, backboard or net. If the line is touched before this happens, a penalty occurs and the shot is void.
- 7. Ties will be broken by taking five additional shots in the same shooting order until the winner is determined.
